Report by the State Superintendent of Education

Student-Based Budgeting Pilot Program

For many district and school leaders, the biggest question this week centered on whether BESE will vote to submit a no-growth or increased MFP proposal to the legislature. While local school districts are grappling with tough choices as they face the end of the one-time federal stimulus funding and substantial increases in pension and employee health care costs, Louisiana's projected \$1.6 billion budget deficit represents one of the most challenging financial times in the history of our state. At the same time, our current circumstance reminds us of the need to prioritize spending, allocating more dollars to initiatives that have the greatest demonstrated impact on student achievement and putting an end to programs and activities that are of little or no benefit to students.

Historically, education funding has been allocated based on beliefs, habits, and institutional norms. But taxpayers are growing impatient with public service sectors failing to produce measurable and valuable outcomes, despite increased outpouring of money. Therefore, the willingness of policy makers and taxpayers to adequately fund public education relies on our ability to provide a measurable return on investment for the students we serve.

At the same time, across our state, the needs of students and schools are great. Despite the notable progress Louisiana has made over the last decade, nearly one-third of our students are performing below grade level, and only 67 percent of our students graduate from high school in the traditional four-year time frame.

This reality requires us to achieve more with the resources we are afforded. To do that, we must start from the beginning – the budgeting process – and transition to a more comprehensive approach that is centered on allocating funds based on the unique needs of students and schools. Only then will we be able to ensure our school leaders and teachers have access to the necessary resources to meet the diverse and compelling needs of their students.

 On Tuesday, seven districts (Assumption Parish, Iberville Parish, Jefferson Parish, Lafourche Parish, Sabine Parish, St. John the Baptist Parish, and Terrebonne Parish) joined Governor Bobby Jindal, members of BESE, and State Superintendent of Education Paul Pastorek to officially announce their participation in Louisiana's Student-Based Budgeting pilot program.

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- Student-Based Budgeting is a collection of academic and financial strategies that, when used together, place a laser focus on student achievement and help ensure that every academic and fiscal decision is filtered through that lens. There is no one, singular model for Student-Based Budgeting. It allows for a unique design in order to address the goals and needs of the students and schools involved, and these districts will be working to design a pilot model, based on their own set of circumstances.
- The pilot program will first focus attention on identifying the components each pilot district would like to address and then developing plans and strategies for implementation.
- Those components may include:
 - funding that follows the child on a per student basis that would vary according to the child's unique needs,
 - o aligning performance goals with budgeting practices for schools,
 - o training principals to be entrepreneurial leaders of their schools, or
 - eliminating inefficient support activity expenditures and dedicating savings to school-level activities.
- The next step will place priority on building capacity in the pilot district and school-level staff to ensure successful implementation.
- All of these actions will be targeted at making pilot districts and schools ready to be full participants in the FY 2012-2013 budgeting process during Spring 2012.
- Other districts are encouraged to consider exploring this funding methodology that has shown remarkable results in other districts across the country.

<u>Optional Facts</u>: One state, Hawaii, and at least 15 major school districts have moved to funding models where *funding follows the student*, and the results are impressive.

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- Since the City of Baltimore introduced its version of this system, Fair Student Funding, in the spring of 2008, district enrollment has increased and the number of dropouts has decreased. Additionally, state standardized test scores have increased in every grade, in both reading and math, since 2008, and the city's graduation rate has risen.
- In Hartford, Connecticut, prior to 2008, less than half the district's education dollars made it to the classroom. Now, over 70 percent is directed to classrooms. As a result, the district's schools posted the largest gains, over three times the average increase on state tests, in 2008.
- San Francisco Unified School District has outperformed comparable large school districts on the California Standards Tests for seven straight years. A greater percentage of San Francisco Unified students graduate from high school than almost any other large urban public school system in the country.
- In Oakland, California, the district has produced the largest four-year gain among large urban districts on California's standardized tests since implementing results-based budgeting in 2004.
- In fact, Denver Public Schools just announced that, through their student-based budgeting model, they would push \$10 million in more funding into the classroom – while taking an overall cut of \$15 million to their budget.

High-Performing, High-Poverty Schools

- Four years ago, an initiative called High-Performing, High-Poverty Schools was initiated to identify and honor those schools overcoming the challenges associated with educating large populations of poor and minority children.
- That first list started with 21 schools and has grown every year. This year, 56 schools in 30 districts have earned the High-Performing, High-Poverty distinction and are being recognized.
- Of those 56 schools, 29 made last year's list, and 13 schools have earned the distinction for three consecutive years.

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- This year's list also represents some firsts. It is the first time any high school or combination school – that's Kindergarten through 12th grade – made the list. Those schools are Sicily Island High School in Catahoula Parish, Pitkin High School in Vernon Parish, and Calvin High School in Winn Parish.
- These schools are all examples that all children can learn; that the hard work of the district leaders, principals, and teachers is resulting in better outcomes for our students.
- On March 29th, the Louisiana Department of Education will again publicly congratulate these 56 schools the administrators, teachers, students, and families for their extraordinary efforts and success.
- The State Superintendent of Education congratulated everyone involved in helping our students achieve this level of success.

ESEA Reauthorization

- The Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA) is up for reauthorization. Adopted in 2001, No Child Left Behind organized the country around holding states accountable for the education of every child. Reauthorization of this important legislation provides the opportunity to renew our commitment to America's children and transform education for the 21st Century.
- Through various associations, LDE has been monitoring and participating in conversations about how it could improve on this federal policy. Likewise, LDE has begun to reach out to stakeholders around the state and will be intensifying this outreach to dialogue about this important topic, which will have profound impact on education policy over the next decade.
- While it appears that there are members in Congress who intend to push aggressively to amend and reauthorize ESEA this year, there are questions regarding whether or not Congress is willing to seriously address the issue this year.
- The LDE will continue to monitor the intel on this and all federal issues and legislation and will continue to engage and inform BESE members, as well as all of Louisiana's stakeholders.
