The Louisiana State Board of Elementary and Secondary Education met in regular session on December 13, 2023, in the Louisiana Purchase Room, located in the Claiborne Building in Baton Rouge, Louisiana. The meeting was called to order at 11:42 a.m. by Board President Dr. Holly Boffy.

Board members present were Mr. Preston Castille, Dr. Belinda Davis, Ms. Ashley Ellis, Mr. James Garvey, Ms. Sandy Holloway, Mr. Michael Melerine, Mr. Ronnie Morris, Ms. Kira Orange Jones, Mr. Tommy Roque, and Ms. Doris Voitier.

Ms. Karley Rockwell, University of Louisiana Lafayette, led the opening prayer, and Ms. Serena White, Monroe City Schools, led the Pledge of Allegiance.

### Agenda Report by the State Superintendent of Education Item 4.

Mr. Ken Bradford, representing State Superintendent of Education Brumley, highlighted the following in his report to the Board:

- Annual Teacher Leader Summit to take place May 28-30, 2024 in New Orleans;
- JumpStart Convention and Child Welfare and Attendance Summit to take place January 23, 2024 in Lafayette;
- Louisiana Scholarship Program accepting applications from eligible families;

- 97% of teacher certification applications are now being processed within 15 business days;
- Dr. Ernise Singleton elected as the national chair for the Military Interstate Children's Compact Commission and will serve as the liaison with school systems relative to military students or students of military families entering the state of Louisiana; and
- State SPS exceeded pre-pandemic levels following two consecutive years of growth, high school students earned record achievements on number of advanced placement tests that get three or higher scores, dual enrollment numbers in the state at the highest level, senior class earned first annual increase in the average ACT score since 2017 even as the national average dropped, and increased scores for second consecutive year in 75% of school systems.

 Dr. Boffy, representing BESE on Year Round Healthy Child Task Force, informed members of the need to get better at getting Medicaid reimbursements, opportunities to make use of federal dollars to meet the needs of students, and collaborations amongst government agencies to open facilities for children such as gyms and tracks for kids to have access to places where they can safely exercise and benefit from physical fitness.

Purpose: The purpose of the CCAP B-3 Seats Pilot Program allocation is to provide funding for birth through three-year-old seats for children who meet CCAP eligibility requirements. In the 2023-2024 year, this program will serve up to 6,500 children. The funding will be allocated to Ready Start Networks and Community Network Lead Agencies that will administer these funds.

Basis of Allocation: The LDOE allocations are based on a combination of the current enrollment of children in CCAP B-3 Seats by Community Network Lead Agencies in the first months of the program and network's anticipated enrollment for the third quarter. The amount of allocation is to fund the third quarter of the academic year and is based on each age group, inclusive of an estimated CCAP bonus. The annual calculation is based on the following rates: infants are funded at \$18,940 per requested seat, toddlers at \$11,700 per requested seat, and three year olds at \$10,670 per seat.

Purpose: The Louisiana Department of Education (LDOE) is committed to advancing literacy skills for all of its children, especially its most disadvantaged children. CLSD UIN targets high-need UIN schools and ECE partners that demonstrate the promise to become models for other high-need sites to replicate. This project focuses on a specific set of evidence-based practices and evidence-informed innovations to strengthen the literacy skills of children birth to 12th grade.

Basis of Allocation: Allocations of funds were decided based on applicants' detailed program descriptions in their CLSD UIN application. This is year three of a three-year grant cohort, as well as year one of a two-year cohort for the second cohort of the five-year grant.

Purpose: The National Disability Innovation Fund grant is intended to provide funds to LEAs to expand workplace apprenticeships and private sector partnerships, and supplement the cost of personnel to engage in the implementation of a newly designed transition framework.

Basis of Allocation: District allocations are calculated by applying a base set of funds per district to support emerging needs. LEAs in full implementation will receive \$20,000 per high school per year, and LEAs in emerging implementation will receive \$10,000 per high school. Every participating LEA will receive \$150,000 annually to support grant activities.

Purpose: Louisiana seeks to strengthen its early childhood care and education system by formalizing local governance for rural community networks. The state recognizes rural communities are best suited to address the unique early childhood care and education needs of their families and children. This funding will support the launch of the Get Ready Cohort 5, which will comprise lead agencies interested in becoming a Ready Start Network. Lead agencies participating will use this funding to support the development of Ready Start activity in their rural community.

Basis of Allocation: A rural expansion of Cohort 5 Ready Start Networks will work to implement strategies for increasing rural access to and improving the quality of publicly funded early childhood care and education in the upcoming year. Each new Ready Start Network is funded \$50,000 for the 2023-2024 academic year.

Purpose: During the 2018 Regular Legislative Session, RS 17:407.23 was amended to authorize BESE to establish Ready Start Network pilot programs to implement new strategies for increasing access to and improving the quality of publicly funded early childhood care and education. Results of the activities undertaken by these pilots informed LDOE, BESE, and the Legislature about the influence of structured, shared decision-making on improving quality and access for publicly funded early childhood programs. Policy to add Ready Start Network as a permanent structure under Bulletin 140 was approved by BESE in April 2022. Currently, there are 37 Ready Start Networks that will continue to pursue this work in the 2023-2024 academic year.

Basis of Allocation: Thirty-seven Ready Start Networks will work to implement new strategies for increasing access to and improving the quality of publicly funded early childhood care and education in the upcoming year. Each Ready Start Network is funded \$100,000 for the 2023-2024 academic year.

One additional network that is included in this allocation is Volunteers of America, which though is not a Ready Start Network, will receive an allocation of PDG funds to close out the activities from the now terminated B-3 seats pilot. The December 2023 BESE action removes funding from Volunteers of America.

Dr. Davis recused herself from voting on this item.

Purpose: The Coronavirus pandemic exacerbated existing gaps in early literacy. Families lack access to quality remote learning resources for young children, especially for early literacy instruction. Parents need to understand and be able to support students in remote learning for students to succeed. Real-time Early Access to Literacy (REAL) provides early literacy support for students in pre-K through grade 5. Through REAL, school systems are allocated funding to provide students in pre-K through grade 5 with tutoring services.

This allocation will provide funding for school systems to offer literacy supports/tutoring to pre-K through fifth-grade students. School systems will receive allocations to fund approved tutoring service providers.

Basis of Allocation: Allocations are based on student populations and school system interest in partnering with an LDOE-approved tutoring provider. Allocations are based on previous year's usage of the program.

Dr. Boffy and Ms. Voitier recused themselves from voting on this item.

On motion of Mr. Roque, seconded by Ms. Ellis, the Board approved the following allocation:

Allocation: Energize: Praxis Exam Computer Science 6-12

Training with SELU

Type: Other

Amount: \$693,000.00

Period: 01/01/2024 – 06/30/2024

Source of Funds: State

Purpose: The purpose of this program is to train 1,100 teachers in grades 6-12 in the content required to pass the Computer Science Praxis Exam (5652). This training will help to increase the number of teachers who are eligible to add computer science in grades 6-12. This will help to increase the number of courses and industry-based credentials in computing available to students.

Basis of Allocation: This allocation awards \$630 to each state-recognized public school that has instruction occurring for students in grades 6-12. For a public school system that has 15 or more locations, a second \$630 award is issued. Statewide, there are 904 locations.

This allocation format will permit a total of 1,100 teachers to receive funding. This allocation is designated to cover one attempt at the Praxis Computer Science Exam (5652), a stipend for the teacher, travel costs for the teacher to attend trainings, and substitute fees needed to cover the teacher's classes while they attend training.

Dr. Boffy, Mr. Castille, Dr. Davis, and Ms. Voitier recused themselves from voting on this item.

Allocation: Ignite-K-5 Computer Science Teacher Training

Type: Other

Amount: \$580,000.00

Period: 01/01/2024 – 05/30/2024

Source of Funds: State

Purpose: The purpose of this program is to train 1,157 teachers grades K-5 in the use of computer science pedagogy, coding, cybersecurity, and computational thinking. Teachers will learn how to redeliver lessons from Code.org and design new lessons for their students.

Basis of Allocation: This allocation awards \$500 to each state-recognized public school that has grades K-5. For a public school system that has 11 or more locations, a second \$500 award is issued. Statewide, there are 738 K-5 locations. This allocation format will permit a total of 1,157 teachers to receive funding and is designated to cover a stipend to the teacher, travel costs for the teacher to attend trainings, and substitute fees needed to cover the teacher's classes while they attend training.

Purpose: This allocation will provide job-embedded, curriculum-based coaching for math teachers supporting high-quality teaching and learning.

Basis of Allocation: Recipients were identified as implementers of three commonly adopted high-quality math materials. The program manager worked with the vendor and the systems to determine the needed coaching professional learning sessions for the system. Systems and schools were prioritized by performance and growth on the most recent LEAP assessment.

Dr. Boffy and Ms. Voitier recused themselves from voting on this item.

Purpose: The purpose of The CHANGE Collective is to improve outcomes for students in schools categorized as persistently struggling. Persistently struggling schools are CIR schools that have earned three or more "F" SPS letter grades in the last five years. During the 2023-2024 school year, six persistently struggling schools across three systems will participate in The CHANGE Collective pilot. Participating systems are Madison Parish, Natchitoches Parish, and St. John the Baptist Parish. Through close collaboration between the LDOE, system and school leaders, and expert national partners, The CHANGE Collective provides priority support to help schools overcome their most challenging barriers.

Basis of Allocation: This additional \$54,000 allocation to St. John the Baptist Parish is designated to increase funding to meet the required cost for the staffing redesign technical assistance secured through a vendor. The initial allocation underestimated the cost of securing vendor services.

Purpose: This funding is to provide for a joint effort of the LDOE, Louisiana Developmental Disabilities Council, Governor's Office of Disability Affairs, and Families Helping Families of Acadiana in order to provide a Louisiana Youth Leadership Forum (LaYLF). LaYLF will provide student participants with capacity building to become student leaders in their schools and communities through a three-day residential leadership program where students attend leadership sessions and build skills in advocacy, independence, employment, and relationships. LaYLF will adhere to standards and best practices set forth by the National Association of Youth Leadership Forums to ensure the highest quality experience for all student leaders.

Basis of Allocation: The total cost of the Youth Leadership Forum for Students with Disabilities will be approximately \$50,000. LDOE will support with \$15,000.
