Description of Service: The University of Louisiana at Monroe will provide support to the LDOE and undertake the following activities:

- Partner with participating Louisiana Center for Effective Transitions (LCET) school districts, which may include Caldwell Parish, Catahoula Parish, Lincoln Parish, and Union Parish to provide specialized industry training and offer a Comprehensive Transition and Postsecondary Program (CTP) to support students with disabilities with postsecondary opportunities.

Purpose: The purpose of the CCAP B-3 Seats Pilot Program allocation is to provide funding for birth through three-year-old seats for children who meet CCAP eligibility requirements. In the 2024-2025 year, this program will serve over 4,000 children. The funding will be allocated to Ready Start Networks and Community Network Lead Agencies that will administer these funds.

Basis of Allocation: The LDOE allocations are based on a combination of the current enrollment of children in CCAP B-3 Seats by Community Network Lead Agencies in the first months of the program and network's anticipated enrollment for the fourth quarter. The amount of allocation is to fund the first quarter of the academic year and is based on each age group, inclusive of an estimated CCAP bonus. The annual calculation is based on the following rates: infants are funded at \$18,940 per requested seat, toddlers at \$11,700 per requested seat, and three year olds at \$10,670 per seat.

Purpose: The purpose of the Comprehensive Literacy State Development Grant (CLSD) grant is to award competitive grants to LEAs to advance literacy skills, including pre-literacy skills, reading, and writing, for all children from birth through grade 12, with a special emphasis on disadvantaged children, including children living in poverty, English Learners, and children with disabilities.

Focus Area: Opportunity to provide additional and enhanced literacy efforts to build the capacity of local leaders, improve the practice of teachers, and increase literacy outcomes for children.

Basis of Allocation: This is the first allocation of the CLSD 3.0 (2024) grant. CLSD 3.0 was awarded on a competitive basis through application reviews using a rubric. Systems awarded demonstrated a need based on high teacher turnover, schools that are currently rated "F" but were not pre-COVID, AUS labeled schools, chronically underperforming early childhood sites that are publicly funded, significant or growing rates of English Learners, and/or at least 50% of students who are at risk of being retained in third grade due to well below performance on the Fall 2024 DIBELS assessment. The top 26% of LEAs, according to scored applications, were awarded funds to implement the literacy initiatives outlined in their applications. Funds are allocated by grade band in which systems applied. Birth-5 received a base allocation of \$100,000 plus \$25,000 per site, K-5 received a base allocation of \$100,000 plus \$25,000 per site, 6-8 received a base allocation of \$110,000 plus \$25,000 per site, and 9-12 received \$110,000 plus \$25,000 per site each year for Year 1.

Allocation: Comprehensive Literacy State Development UIN

Type: Competitive Amount: \$12,175,000.00

Period: 07/01/2025 – 09/30/2025

Source of Funds: Federal

Purpose: The LDOE is committed to advancing literacy skills for all of its children. CLSD UIN targets high-need UIN schools and ECE partners that demonstrate the promise to become models for other high-need sites to replicate. This project focuses on a specific set of evidence-based practices and evidence-informed innovations to strengthen the literacy skills of children birth to 12th grade.

Basis of Allocation: Allocations of funds were decided based on applicants' detailed program descriptions in their CLSD UIN application. This is year five of funding for a five-year grant, and funding in this round is funding cohort 2 and 3 schools involved in the expansion of the signature literacy innovation. Funding will end September 30, 2025, and Louisiana is pending a no-cost extension to extend funding through June 30, 2026.

Purpose: The National Disability Innovation Fund grant is intended to provide funds to LEAs to expand workplace apprenticeships and private sector partnerships, and supplement the cost of personnel to engage in the implementation of a newly designed transition framework.

Basic of Allocation: Each school system is receiving an additional \$70,000 to support community partnerships in alignment with the transition grant activities.

Source of Funds: Federal – IDEA

Purpose: School systems will utilize funds to serve two purposes. First, the funds will ensure that all students with disabilities have access to the same high-quality curriculum materials as their peers by providing for training on how to implement these materials to special education teachers and regular education teachers who teach students with disabilities. Second, school systems will partner with a vendor from the Professional Learning Partner Guide that provides specially designed instruction for students with disabilities in the areas of communication, assistive technology, executive functioning, and sensory/environment. These vendor partnerships will support networks in adapting content, methods, or delivery of instruction to address the unique needs of students with a disability and ensure access and success toward measurable and rigorous goals.

Basis of Allocation: Funds are allocated based on the need of the school system and number of schools within the system. School systems that met all CIR/UIR-Academic criteria as stated in the 2025-2026 School System Planning Workbook were eligible to receive a portion of requested high-quality professional development costs in the form of these IDEA funds. In order to be eligible for optional competitive funding for specialized support professional learning, school systems must identify the vendors from the Professional Learning Partner Guide with whom they will partner to provide professional learning at UIR-Academics schools. School systems with at least one school identified as UIR in the students with disabilities group may request optional competitive funding to subsidize professional development from vendors in the Professional Learning Partner Guide.

Type: Competitive Amount: \$517,000.00

Period: 07/01/2025 – 06/30/2026

Source of Funds: Federal – IDEA

Purpose: Early Childhood Lead Agencies (CNLAs) will utilize funds to partner with vendors from the Professional Learning Partners Guide, or other vendors directly related to school system developmental screeners. Professional development supporting developmental screening can include training materials and resources, and teacher stipends and/or substitute pay for professional development recipients. Funding can also be utilized to partner with vendors from the Professional Learning Partners Guide or other vendors that are directly related to the use of specialized supports for educators supporting young children with disabilities.

Basis of Allocation: Funds are allocated to early childhood lead agencies, based on federal funding distribution amounts and LEA need.

Allocation: School Redesign (Title I Grants to Local Education

Type: Competitive Amount: \$23,972,140.00

Period: 04/19/2025 - 09/30/2026

Source of Funds: Federal – Redesign

Purpose: The Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) requires school systems to build plans to improve struggling schools. The state must use 7% of the state's Title I funds to support high-quality improvement plans. In Louisiana, these funds will be competitively awarded to school systems that build the strongest plans for improvement.

Basic of Allocation: ESSA requires that local school systems create a plan to improve the performance of students in persistently struggling schools. ESSA also provides school improvement funding to implement state-approved plans in identified struggling schools. LDOE staff reviewed applications from eligible school systems and determined allocations based on the quality of each plan.

Recipients of school improvement funding must comply with all terms of the grant, including implementing all CIR/UIR-Academic approval and funding criteria as identified in the 2025-2026 LDOE School System Planning Workbook.

LEAs that do not meet the requirements of the grant and the implementation timeline will forfeit these school improvement allocations.

Purpose: Title IV supports student academic achievement and provides access to a well-rounded education, improves school conditions for student learning, and improves the use of technology.

Basis of Allocation: Targeted support for schools and school systems with an average of 13 or more missed days from school to engage an Attendance Support Specialist to support school attendance initiatives to improve academic success. The LDOE is committed to supporting regular school attendance to make our schools better, our communities safer, and our economy stronger. In order to promote good school attendance and reduce chronic absenteeism, the LDOE is offering evidence-based best practices and providing funding for professional learning to support schools and systems.

This allocation will provide student registration, transportation, and lodging for aspiring educators to attend the largest educator professional learning in the state.

Basis of Allocation: The availability of the funding was advertised via multiple educator development standing communications including the monthly preparation provider email blast, the pre-educator pathway programs contact list, and the LDOE weekly newsletter. School systems submitted a form describing lodging and transportation costs. All systems that submitted a complete application will receive funding to offset costs for registration, travel, and lodging.

Purpose: The purpose of the Cecil J. Picard LA 4 Early Childhood Program is to provide high-quality early childhood educational experiences to four-year-old children who are considered to be "at risk" of achieving later academic success. The LA 4 program provides six hours per day of educational experiences. The program will be offered at no cost to those children whose families are at or below 200% of the federal poverty limit. In 2025-2026, LA 4 will serve at least 17,100 children. Programs will adhere to state approved guidelines and regulations.

Basic of Allocation: All school systems and charter schools are eligible to submit an application for funding. Allocations were based on prior participation, participation in an early childhood community network, and community need. Monies are allocated on a per pupil basis at \$5,580. Actual reimbursement is based on recipients filling all allocated seats and students meeting attendance thresholds. Award amounts are based on the 2025-2026 final allocations for student participation for each of the participating school systems. Awards for this program are contingent upon approval of funding.

Purpose: The purpose of this program is to support the recruitment and retention of teachers in Louisiana. Mentor teachers help increase the retention of beginning educators, and also the retention of teacher leaders who serve in this role. Eligible Early Childhood teacher residents and mentors receive a stipend for the duties they perform. This stipend is paid for with 8(g) funds.

Basis of Allocation: Twenty-one residents and 20 mentors qualified for this stipend. The timeframe for these duties to be performed was from January 1, 2024, to December 31, 2024 (second semester 2023-2024 school year and first semester 2024-2025 school year) or the 2024-2025 school year. Parishes receiving these funds are Allen, Assumption, Bossier, Central Community Schools, East Baton Rouge (2), Iberia, Iberville (3), Morehouse, Rapides (3), St. Landry (2), St. Tammany (2), Tangipahoa (2), and Terrebonne. Early Childhood residents are eligible for a \$3,300 stipend. Early Childhood mentors are eligible for a \$2,000 stipend.

Purpose: The purpose of the Nonpublic School Early Childhood Development (NSECD) Program is to collaborate with non-public schools and Type III child care centers in providing high-quality, developmentally appropriate preschool instruction and services to preschool-aged children who are considered to be at risk of achieving later academic success. The NSECD Program provides six hours per day of pre-Kindergarten instruction. The program is offered at no cost to children whose families fall below 200% of the federal poverty level.

Basis of Allocation: All BESE/Brumfield-Dodd approved non-public schools and licensed accredited Type III child care centers are eligible to submit an application for funding. Money is awarded on a per pupil basis at a minimum of \$5,580 per child per year. Actual reimbursement is based on recipients filling all allocated seats and students meeting attendance thresholds. Award amounts are based on reported enrollment, Performance Profile ratings, early childhood community network participation, and parish need.

Purpose: This funding provides for supplemental appropriations for the Non Federal Support program, STAR Academy, in accordance with Act 776 of the 2024 Regular Session.

Star Academy is a turn-key program aimed at re-engaging at-risk students, in the middle grades. The program is STEM inspired and focuses on hands-on engagement through project-based learning at the core of every lesson. The turn-key aspect includes:

- customize lesson structure based on school and regional economic needs;
- full build out of the classroom including extensive remodeling;
- installation of all project-based learning equipment;
- extensive professional development for teacher prior to the start of instruction; and
- on-going professional development on a monthly basis for three years (with a contract extension available).

Basis of Allocation: The recipients of this funding were chosen based on a need to scale existing programs that have met capacity for multiple years or have a graduation rate lower than the state average. Activities include accelerated instruction and expanded academic support through small-group instruction.
